

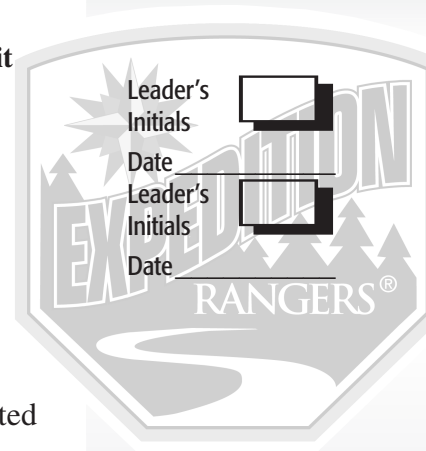


# Shotgun Shooting Merit

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## 1. Range setup

- a. Gun: Any 12 gauge or smaller may be used. All guns should be inspected for safety before use.
- b. Ammunition: Any round smaller than 12 gauge may be used.
- c. Targets: Standard clay targets are used. If targets are thrown with a hand trap, they should be thrown at an upward angle of approximately 30 degrees and at approximately the same speed. Each target should be thrown in a different horizontal direction, not to exceed 30 degrees on either side of a center point.
- d. Distance: In order to qualify for the Royal Rangers National Championship, the distance must be sixteen yards.
- e. Rules: Follow the current Amateur Trapshooting Association (ATA) rules.
- f. Position: Shooters have the option of mounting the shotgun on the shoulder before calling for the target.
- g. Equipment: Any hand, manual, or automatic trap may be used.
- h. Course of fire: Two rounds of twenty-five targets. Each must be shot and scored with a minimum of 52 percent (thirteen or more out of twenty-five targets). Rounds do not have to be shot consecutively or in the same session.

- b. List the number of stations involved in Trap.
- c. List the minimum distance the clay disks are thrown.
- d. List the speed the clay disks are thrown by a mechanical device.
- e. List the year Trap was introduced as an Olympic event.
- f. Describe the men's course of fire for Trap in the Olympics.

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
