- 5. Assemble the following gear (purchase or borrow) and explain its purpose:



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- 8. List the creel limits, likely species of fish to be taken, and license requirements for your state.
- 9. Select a mentor (approved by your commander) who has some skill and experience in fly-fishing. With the mentor's assistance and approval, complete the following:
 - a. Demonstrate three or more basic knots from Requirement 6.
 - b. Review the vocabulary terms from Requirement 7.
 - c. Practice casting in a closely mowed grassy area that is free of any obstruction for an area at least eighty feet in diameter. Use a wad of colorful yarn (no hooks) as the bait and a paper plate as a target and learn to cast consistently twenty-five to forty feet and hit or come near the target.
 - d. Move to a body of quiet water (pond or lake) and practice with a dry or wet fly, following your mentor's recommendation when your mentor believes that your skill level would allow some success. Comply with your state's license requirements as needed.
 - e. Move to an area where it is likely that fish may be taken following your mentor's recommendation. Observe all creel limits and license requirements for your state.
 - f. Go on two or more fly-fishing outings and record the following information for each outing:
 - 1. Species of fish caught
 - 2. Length of each fish
 - 3. Weight of each fish
 - 4. Bait used
 - 5. Date taken
 - g. Place your mentor's report in your workbook.
